The goal of FPP services is to improve the outcomes for children who are involved in multiple systems, supporting parents and caregivers, increasing ability to manage their own services and offer support to promote recovery and wellness.

Family Peer Partner (FPP)

A family partner is part of a treatment team that can offer support, encouragement, and assistance while drawing on their own experience to help families be even more successful in achieving their goals.

A family partner peer shares knowledge, teaches skills, and provides practical assistance while connecting people to opportunities within the community.

A partner uses specific skills, lived experiences, and strengths to help family members on a journey to better health, mind, and body. A companion instills recovery and resilience by helping people meet their needs more efficiently, with greater confidence and hope.

FPP Assistance and Support

May look like the following:

- Attend relevant meetings as additional support while encouraging self-advocacy
- Connecting families with local social support and developing community relationships
- Help parents learn to navigate the Juvenile Justice System, Drug Court, Behavioral Health/Child Welfare Child & Family Team (CFT) meetings, Individualized Education Plans (IEPs), Child Welfare Services, Substance Use Disorder Treatment, and/or Specialty Mental Health Services
- Model collaboration between families, service providers, community agencies, and natural supports
- Helping caregiver to identify individual strengths and goals, navigate systems more successfully, and support the continued success of the entire family
