
Summary of Agenda Item (Description of Issue):

- 1. There was a slight decrease in ridership after the full fares started April 17, 2023, with an increase in ticket sales in June.
- 2. The Transportation Service Worker for airport maintenance and relief bus driver is still posted and is not filled at this time.
- 3. In partnership with the Cities of Yreka and Montague and the YMCA, STAGE will again be participating in the Swim Program for students. From June 13th thru August 3^{rd.}, Tuesdays and Thursdays, STAGE will pick up children at the YMCA at 1:30pm and deliver them to the Montague pool. Then at 4:00pm STAGE will pick them up and ride back to the YMCA.
- 4. The FAA has increased the funding for the Phase I of the Weed Airport Taxiway and Apron asphalt replacement. The Construction budget was \$3,323,186.67 and has been increased to \$4,437,727.
- 5. Vali Aviation has successfully installed the new tank for 100LL fuel at the Weed Airport
- 6. Vali Aviation has installed a new meter on the Jet A fuel at Siskiyou County Airport.
- 7. The Forest Service's AirTac plane is stationed at the Siskiyou County Airport and will remain for fire activities.
- 8. CalFire will be moving into the Siskiyou County Airport in June for fire activities.

Chair Ogren called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

2. Presentation from the Public

Kelly Zolotoff introduced the new assistant coordinator for District 2 in Caltrans. Kerry Molz provided an update on the Sacramento Gap Combination Project. She stated that it will start soon and that there will be an open house on May 10th in Dunsmuir and another in Weed on May 11th.

Commissioner Deutsch asked if the open house in Dunsmuir could be recorded and Ms. Molz stated that while it can be, it will not be a formal meeting and that it

may not be the best recording. Commissioner Tavalero asked if the Weed meeting will be recorded and Ms. Molz said that that one will be recorded and will be a more formal setting where she will have handouts.

Executive Director Melissa Cummins stated that a correction needs to be made to item "h" as it should state that the Unmet Needs Meeting will actually be on June 13th instead of June 6th.

4. Presentation/Discussion – Caltrans – Highway 3 Corridor Plan

Executive Director Melissa Cummins apologized and explained to the commission that the presenter for this item could not be present at the meeting today because of personal reasons. She explained that information that can be shared at this time is that the Highway 3 Corridor Plan is an analysis of the transit route that will facilitate a 20-year consensus that analyzes various factors that contribute to its success or failures and will help identify future projects. She also stated that on May

12, 2023, it will be released and there will be a 30-day review period where comments can be made on it.

- 5. Discussion/Action Teleconference Meeting Participation Executive Director Melissa Cummins stated that AB2449 states that it is no longer necessary for the commissioners to post where they will be when attending via Zoom or put it into the agenda. Instead, they will only need to let the commission know 10 days in advance and can still attend via zoom but will not be able to participate. Commissioner Deutsch was concerned that this was incorrect and Ms. Cummins said that she will review the policy again and let the commission know whether or not she is correct on this policy going forward.
- 6. Discussion/Action Regional Surface Transportation Program Allocation of Funds

Ms. Cummins explained what the Regional Surface Transportation Program Allocation of Funds was. She stated that the City of Etna had submitted a project to the last call for projects for the amount of \$89,000.00 and that it was the only project submitted.

Ms. Cummins suggested going out for another call for projects as two more agencies have reached out to her since the last and stated that they need additional funds. The town of Tulelake needs \$60,000.00 and the town of Montague needs \$10,000.00.

A motion was made by Commissioner Kobseff and seconded by Commissioner Deutsch to approve the allocation of \$89,000.00 to the City of Etna for their project and another call for projects with the remaining funds for this year.

7. Discussion/Action – FY 2021/2022 Financial Audits

Ms. Cummins discussed Current Years Matters Finding 2022-001 Material Weakness. GASB No.84 required that fiduciary funds to be changed to special revenue funds. It was determined the Commission has deficiencies in the internal controls over financial close and reporting that prevented it from properly closing the books and preparing financial

statements. Primarily because of not implementing the requirements of GASB No.84. It is recommended the Commission ensure the requirements of GASB No.84 are implemented immediately.

Ms. Cummins discussed Significant Deficiency – Compliance 2022-002 Allocation of Local Transportation Funds. Management did not have appropriate procedures established to ensure claims get timely processed. Commission's Executive Director will work with County Auditor to establish a direct line of communication.

Ms. Cummins discussed Significant Deficiency 2022-003 Budgetary and Budgetary Accounting. Because GASB No 84 was not implemented the Commission did not prepare and adopt budget for special revenue funds. It is recommended Commission prepare and adopt a budget for all major special revenue funds.

 - b. Reason they are unable to attend.
 - c. Phone number and email address.

Note: Commissioners that want to participate via teleconference or zoom, for quorum purposes, will only be allowed to twice per year, otherwise their alternate would need to attend.

2) If a commissioner has emergency circumstances, under the 10-day limit, that precludes them from attending in-person they will be able to attend via teleconference or zoom but will not be able to participate in the meeting for quorum purposes, including making public comments. An emergency is defined as a physical or family emergency that prevents them from attending in person.

City of Yreka has elected to not proceed with their projects at this time. Their funds have been added back to our current balance. Currently, the following funding amount is available through the RSTP:

• Total anticipated available amount - \$262,954.50

A Call for Projects was issued and distributed to members of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) on May 14, 2023. The deadline to submit projects for consideration was May 29, 2023.

Staff received three applications. They were from the City of Etna for the remaining amount for a project located on Cleveland Street, the City of Tulelake for sidewalk improvement on Main Street and the City of Montague for the rehabilitation of 6th Street. Their project information is included for the Commission's review.

The summary of allocations is also included per the request of the Commission.



The City currently has \$75,000 available for the construction phase of the 6th Street Rehabilitation Project, this is through CRRSAA funding.

When the initial Engineer's estimate for this project was completed the cost of paving was around \$140/ton. Recent bids reflect a cost of \$200/ton of asphalt.

One item that was not accounted for was traffic control within the Caltrans Right of Way.

Since 6th Street ties to Highway 3, work will need to be performed within the Caltrans Right of Way in order to rehabilitate the full length of the street. If City of Montague choses to stay out of the Caltrans Right of Way, approximately 15 feet of street would stay untouched, and currently the street is in pretty bad shape, so tying into Highway 3 would be most beneficial to the City of Montague.

The expectation is that contractors will bid the traffic control item high since most likely lane closures will be required on Highway 3 during construction, similar to what is currently being seen within Yreka.

Mainly these two items, Asphalt Paving and Traffic Control, have increased City of Montague's estimated cost of construction for this project. In order to pave the entire length of the street, up to Highway 3, the City is asking for a total of \$34,000, which includes contingencies and Construction Oversight.



City of Tulelake – Main Street Sidewalk Improvements

Dear Ms. Cummins:

In 2020, the City received State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) funds for sidewalk, curb & gutter, asphalt reconstruction and overlays throughout various areas of the City. With remaining allocated STIP funds supplemented by Transportation Development Act (TDA) and Senate Bill 1 (SB1) funds, the City will be constructing ADA compliant curb ramp improvements to a four-way stop intersection at E Street/Main Street in downtown Tulelake.

The intersection is controlled by both a four-way red flashing light (suspended in the middle of the intersection) and four (4) stop signs. However, these traffic devices have not demonstrated to be adequate in providing a safe intersection for pedestrians as well as motorists. Main Street and E Street are 80 feet wide from curb to curb with angled parking on both sides.

The current available funding is not sufficient for constructing the entirety of the planned and designed E Street/Main Street intersection improvements. Part of the improvements that will have to be deferred is to reconstruct approximately 145 feet of curb, gutter and sidewalk on Main Street immediately south of the southwest corner of the intersection that is in a state of deterioration with tripping hazards to pedestrians and adjacent businesses.

The proposed Main Street Sidewalk Improvements project would provide a safe ADA compliant walkway in downtown Tulelake. This improvement qualifies for the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) Exchange Program. This project would provide pedestrians with a safe pedestrian walkway, and would therefore meet the criteria for eligible projects under this program.

The estimated cost of this project is \$70,707 (see attached Engineer's Estimate and Cost Breakdown). The City requests the full project cost of \$70,707, provided the project amount can be allocated in this call for projects. If the requested project cost cannot be allocated, the City would be pleased to receive any allocation the Commission decides is appropriate.

The City will provide local matching funds for any portion of this project that is not covered by the RSTP funds. The funds will be maintained in a separate account, all phases of the project will be competitively bid, and all administration requirements of managing the project and reporting progress will be met by City staff.

Thank you in advance for submitting the City's request to the Commission for its consideration.

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I. Introduction

Siskiyou County lies on the northern boundary of California, bordered by Oregon to the north, Del Norte and Humboldt Counties to the west, Trinity, and Shasta Counties to the south and Modoc County to the east. The economic base of the County is a combination of agriculture, forest products and recreation.

According to the County Assessor's Office Siskiyou County currently has 4,040,320 acres of land. Of these acres approximately 2,505,841 acres or 62% are owned by federal agencies such as the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, US Fish and Wildlife Service, Lava Beds National Monument, or the Bureau of Reclamation.

Information obtained from the California Department of Finance on estimated population as of January 2022 indicates a projected County population of 43,830. The table to the left indicates the estimated population for incorporated cities in Siskiyou County.

The projected unincorporated County population of 24,039 is comprised of numerous smaller communities such as Cecilville, Somes Bar, Greenview, Callahan, McCloud, Tennant, Macdoel, Hilt, Henley, Hornbrook, Grenada, Lake Shastina, Seiad Valley and Happy Camp.

Siskiyou County is approximately 6,287 square miles. A large portion of Siskiyou County is owned by the federal government, which limits the amount of property tax available to the County.

II. Public Participation

Monthly meeting agenda packets are sent to members of the Commission, Siskiyou County staff, the Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), and the Technical Advisory Council (TAC) through email, posted to the SCLTC website, a link is posted on the Commission's Facebook page and posted at the Transit Center where accessible to the public. The SSTAC and TAC include Tribal representatives.

Commission staff also coordinate with the Public Information Officer for the County of Siskiyou to push information out through their various social media platforms to increase public awareness and increase participation in various Commission activities.

Additional activities could include attending public events such as Gold Rush Days, Siskiyou Golden Fair, and College of the Siskiyous informational events.

III. Issues and State Funding Priorities

The Siskiyou County Local Transportation Commission (SCLTC) is designated the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for the County. This local entity monitors and coordinates project eligibility for state highway funding and public transportation.

According to the California Department of Finance the County's estimated population has decreased slightly. The County's population density continues to average approximately seven residents per square mile. The minimal population coupled with the County's rural character has prevented large land use development. In recent years we have experienced some minimal growth in certain sectors. Given the backlog of transportation infrastructure needs there is still a constant lack of adequate funding for ongoing repairs and upgrades. Although Siskiyou County has a low population density, we still experience heavy truck traffic and thousands of visitors and tourists that travel to and through the County each year, ultimately impacting the transportation system and generating a need for greater maintenance requirements on existing local roadways. Given the County's position as the last stop along the I5 corridor our goal is to encourage travelers to stop here to spend money before leaving the state thereby increasing revenues for the State and the County.

An additional source of funding for minor road maintenance in Siskiyou County has been the Local Transportation Fund (LTF), which is provided through the Transportation Development Act. This funding is of particular importance for the smaller communities that generate very little fuel tax money.

The transit operator continues to set aside a portion of the annual LTF allocation received for the replacement of the transit fleet. The Siskiyou County Short Range Transit Plan (last updated in 2021) recommended an annual contribution to this reserve, which will provide match money for future purchases with grant funding.

The rural nature of Siskiyou County assures us that the primary mode of transportation is, and will continue to be, the automobile. Fuel prices continue to hover between \$ 4.00 and \$ 5.00 per gallon. Based on data from the State of California Employment Development Department (EDD) Siskiyou County's unemployment rate for February 2023 was 7.7%. This is somewhat higher than the State of California's unemployment rate of 4.3% for the same period.

The County transit system continues to play a critical role in meeting transportation needs of many residents who are transit dependent. According to the California Department of Finance, 35.7% of our population is comprised of residents aged sixty or above. An ongoing need for expanded fixed route services and specialized paratransit transportation, particularly for service to medical facilities both in and out of the county, exists within the region. Many residents travel to Redding, California or Medford, Oregon for medical care and traversing the mountain passes in the winter can create a hardship. This request for services to either Redding or Medford still exists after many years and attempts.

Siskiyou County has seven public use airports located throughout the County. Butte Valley, Happy Camp, Scott Valley, Weed and Siskiyou County Airports are operated by Siskiyou County. Mott Airport is operated by the City of Dunsmuir. Montague-Yreka Rohrer Field is operated by the City of Montague with an annual contribution of \$5,000 from the City of Yreka. None currently provide commercial passenger services. Previous attempts to establish scheduled service to various destinations have not been successful due primarily to the low population base in the County. Residents must travel to Redding, California or Medford, Oregon to access commercial passenger service. There are bases for firefighting aircraft, package delivery, bank courier services and general aviation operations out of six of the seven airports.

The County and other agencies operating airports within the region have faced an ongoing financial struggle with maintaining the various airport infrastructures due to a variety of factors including lack of supporting revenue in previous fiscal years, slow growth in the region, and limited opportunities for development. The annual credits from Caltrans Aeronautics equate to approximately \$60,000 for the region's airport system. The lack of funding and failing infrastructure cannot be addressed until the County experiences substantial infrastructure improvements and increased economic growth.

IV. Organization

The Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) representing Siskiyou County is the Siskiyou County Local Transportation Commission (SCLTC). The six-member commission consists of four members (three seats and one alternate) appointed by the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors and four members (three seats and one alternate) appointed by the Siskiyou League of Local Agencies, which is elected officials from the nine incorporated cities in Siskiyou County.

Siskiyou County's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is a working group with representatives from each of the nine cities, three tribal entities, Caltrans, Siskiyou County Public Works, and SCLTC staff. The TAC meets as needed to discuss proposed projects for the Regional Transportation Improvement Plan and other transportation planning issues that affect our agencies and the region.

SCLTC coordinates its activities with various County Departments, as well as State, local and tribal entities. Citizen groups are encouraged to provide input through public hearings, such as the Unmet Transit Needs

process, to solve specific transportation problems which are of concern to the community. The SCLTC expanded the public input process by updating the website to include a variety of items being heard by the Commission. The Commission also maintains a Facebook page where information regarding upcoming meetings is regularly posted.

In 1978 SCLTC contracted with a consultant to update the 1976 Transportation Needs Study. An advisory group of County citizens and representatives from various transportation providers with a particular interest in, and knowledge of, public transportation needs was formed. The advisory group, known as the Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), consists of eleven members representing a diverse cross section of citizens from various geographic areas of the County. Specific membership composition is in conformance with state law.

V. Work Program

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) is a long-term planning document that provides a 20+ year vision of the region's transportation system. It is understood that the purpose of the continuing planning process is to ensure that the RTP is responsive to the changing needs of users. However, with the increased emphasis by State government for coordination between counties and Caltrans regarding Regional Transportation Improvement Plan (RTIP), Air Quality and Environmental Concerns and Caltrans Division of Aeronautics Program, it is now necessary for RTP's to be responsive to the States' planning process in addition to being responsive to regional needs. The last Regional Transportation Plan was developed in 2021.

The 2023/2024 Overall Work Program (OWP) covers a one-year period. The work program defines the degree of planning efforts that will be expended for elements relating to the county's transportation system. This OWP is subject to financial constraints, as there are limited resources (staff, time, funding) to address a wide range of complex issues.

VI. Work Elements

A. Work Element 601.1 - Administration

Purpose

This task includes daily/weekly/monthly activities such as compiling and distributing monthly LTC meeting agendas, managing the Siskiyou County LTC website, preparing or overseeing financial audits and reports, managing consultant contracts, and reporting news and policy from the State and Federal level. The overall purpose of this task is to ensure the Siskiyou County LTC is operating efficiently and within all applicable regulations, guides and policies and performing the duties associated with a Regional Transportation Planning Agency.

B. Work Element 601.2 - Coordination

Purpose

 - (3) Section 5332 of the Federal Transit Law (49 U.S.C. § 5332), which prohibits any person being excluded from participating in, denied a benefit of, or discriminated against under, a project, program, or activity receiving financial assistance from FTA because of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability, or age.
 - (4) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. § 794), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicaps, as effectuated by U.S. DOT regulation 49 CFR Part 27;
 - (5) The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. §§ 6101–6107), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age;
 - (6) The Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972 (P.L. 92-255), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse;
 - (7) The comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Act of 1970 (P.L. 91–616), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of alcohol abuse or alcoholism;
 - (8) Sections 523 and 527 of the Public Health Service Act of 1912 (42 U.S.C. §§ 290 dd-3 and 290 ee-3), as amended, relating to confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse patient records;
 - (9) Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. §§ 3601 et seq.), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination in the sale, rental, or financing of housing;
 - (10) Any other nondiscrimination provisions in the specific statute(s) under which application for Federal assistance is being made; and,
 - (11) the requirements of any other nondiscrimination statute(s) which may apply to the application.
- (g) Will comply, or has already complied, with the requirements of Titles II and III of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 ("Uniform Act") (P.L. 91-646) which provide for fair and equitable treatment of persons displaced or whose property is acquired as a result of Federal or federally-assisted programs. These requirements apply to all interests in real property acquired for project purposes regardless of Federal participation in purchases. The requirements of the Uniform Act are effectuated by U.S. DOT regulation 49 CFR Part 24.

- (h) Will comply, as applicable, with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. §§ 1501–1508 and 7324–7328) which limit the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

- (j) Will comply, if applicable, with flood insurance purchase requirements of Section 102(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (P.L. 93-234) which requires recipients in a special flood hazard area to participate in the program and to purchase flood insurance if the total cost of insurable construction and acquisition is \$10,000 or more.
- (k) Will comply with environmental standards which may be prescribed pursuant to the following:

 - (7) Protection of underground sources of drinking water under the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, as amended (P.L. 93-523); and
 - (8) Protection of endangered species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (P.L. 93–205).
- (l) Will comply with the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968 (16 U.S.C. §§ 1271 et seq.) related to protecting components or potential components of the national wild and scenic rivers system.
- (m) Will assist the awarding agency in assuring compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended (16 U.S.C. § 470), EO 11593 (identification and protection of historic properties), and the Archaeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. §§ 469a-1 et seq.).
- (n) Will comply with P.L. 93-348 regarding the protection of human subjects involved in research, development, and related activities supported by this award of assistance.
- (o) Will comply with the Laboratory Animal Welfare Act of 1966 (P.L. 89-544, as amended, 7 U.S.C. §§ 2131 et seq.) pertaining to the care, handling, and treatment of warm blooded

- animals held for research, teaching, or other activities supported by this award of assistance.
- (p) Will comply with the Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 4801 et seq.) which prohibits the use of lead-based paint in construction or rehabilitation of residence structures.
- (q) Will cause to be performed the required financial and compliance audits in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart F, "Audit Requirements", as adopted and implemented by U.S. DOT at 2 CFR Part 1201.
- (r) Will comply with all applicable requirements of all other Federal laws, executive orders, regulations, and policies governing the program under which it is applying for assistance.
- (s) Will comply with the requirements of Section 106(g) of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA) of 2000, as amended (22 U.S.C. § 7104) which prohibits grant award recipients or a subrecipient from:
 - (1) Engaging in severe forms of trafficking in persons during the period of time that the award is in effect;
 - (2) Procuring a commercial sex act during the period of time that the award is in effect; or
 - (3) Using forced labor in the performance of the award or subawards under the award.

1.2. Standard Assurances: Additional Assurances for Construction Projects.

This certification appears on the Office of Management and Budget's standard form 424D "Assurances—Construction Programs" and applies specifically to federally assisted projects for construction. This certification has been modified in places to include analogous certifications required by U.S. DOT statutes or regulations.

As the duly authorized representative of the applicant, you certify that the applicant:

CATEGORY 2. PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AGENCY SAFETY PLANS

This certification is required of each applicant under the Urbanized Area Formula Grants Program (49 U.S.C. § 5307), each rail operator that is subject to FTA's state safety oversight programs, and each State that is required to draft and certify a public transportation agency safety plan on behalf of a small public transportation provider pursuant to 49 CFR § 673.11(d). This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

4.2. Statement for Loan Guarantees and Loan Insurance.

The undersigned states, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

If any funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this commitment providing for the United States to insure or guarantee a loan, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

Submission of this statement is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required statement shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

CATEGORY 5. PRIVATE SECTOR PROTECTIONS.

If the applicant will apply for funds that it will use to acquire or operate public transportation facilities or equipment, the applicant must make the following certification regarding protections for the private sector.

5.1. Charter Service Agreement.

To enforce the provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 5323(d), FTA's charter service regulation requires each applicant seeking assistance from FTA for the purpose of acquiring or operating any public transportation equipment or facilities to make the following Charter Service Agreement. 49 CFR § 604.4.

- (4) The applicant agrees that the project facilities and equipment shall be used for the provision of mass transportation services within its urban area and that any other use of project facilities and equipment will be incidental to and shall not interfere with the use of such facilities and equipment in mass transportation service to the public.

CATEGORY 6. TRANSIT ASSET MANAGEMENT PLAN.

If the applicant owns, operates, or manages capital assets used to provide public transportation, the following certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5326(a).

The applicant certifies that it is in compliance with 49 CFR Part 625.

CATEGORY 7. ROLLING STOCK BUY AMERICA REVIEWS AND BUS TESTING.

7.1. Rolling Stock Buy America Reviews.

If the applicant will apply for an award to acquire rolling stock for use in revenue service, it must make this certification. This certification is required by 49 CFR § 663.7.

- (b) Has or will have satisfactory continuing control over the use of equipment and facilities;
- (c) Will maintain equipment and facilities in accordance with the applicant's transit asset management plan;
- (d) Will ensure that, during non-peak hours for transportation using or involving a facility or equipment of a project financed under this section, a fare that is not more than 50 percent of the peak hour fare will be charged for any—
 - (1) Senior;
 - (2) Individual who, because of illness, injury, age, congenital malfunction, or any other incapacity or temporary or permanent disability (including an individual who is a wheelchair user or has semi-ambulatory capability), cannot use a public transportation service or a public transportation facility effectively without special facilities, planning, or design; and
 - (3) Individual presenting a Medicare card issued to that individual under title II or XVIII of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 401 et seq., and 1395 et seq.);
- (e) In carrying out a procurement under 49 U.S.C. § 5307, will comply with 49 U.S.C. § 5323 (general provisions) and 5325 (contract requirements);
- (f) Has complied with 49 U.S.C. § 5307(b) (program of projects requirements);

- (g) Has available and will provide the required amounts as provided by 49 U.S.C. § 5307(d) (cost sharing);
- (h) Will comply with 49 U.S.C. §§ 5303 (metropolitan transportation planning) and 5304 (statewide and nonmetropolitan transportation planning);
- (i) Has a locally developed process to solicit and consider public comment before raising a fare or carrying out a major reduction of transportation;
- (j) Either—
 - (1) Will expend for each fiscal year for public transportation security projects, including increased lighting in or adjacent to a public transportation system (including bus stops, subway stations, parking lots, and garages), increased camera surveillance of an area in or adjacent to that system, providing an emergency telephone line to contact law enforcement or security personnel in an area in or adjacent to that system, and any other project intended to increase the security and safety of an existing or planned public transportation system, at least 1 percent of the amount the recipient receives for each fiscal year under 49 U.S.C. § 5336; or
 - (2) Has decided that the expenditure for security projects is not necessary;
- (k) In the case of an applicant for an urbanized area with a population of not fewer than 200,000 individuals, as determined by the Bureau of the Census, will submit an annual report listing projects carried out in the preceding fiscal year under 49 U.S.C. § 5307 for associated transit improvements as defined in 49 U.S.C. § 5302; and
- (l) Will comply with 49 U.S.C. § 5329(d) (public transportation agency safety plan).

CATEGORY 9. FORMULA GRANTS FOR RURAL AREAS.

If the applicant will apply for funds made available to it under the Formula Grants for Rural Areas Program (49 U.S.C. § 5311), it must make this certification. Paragraph (a) of this certification helps FTA make the determinations required by 49 U.S.C. § 5310(b)(2)(C). Paragraph (b) of this certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5311(f)(2). - (b) If the applicant will in any fiscal year expend less than 15% of the total amount made available to it under 49 U.S.C. § 5311 to carry out a program to develop and support intercity bus transportation, the applicant certifies that it has consulted with affected intercity bus service providers, and the intercity bus service needs of the State are being met adequately.
- (c) If the applicant will use for a highway project amounts that cannot be used for operating expenses authorized under 49 U.S.C. § 5311(c)(2) (Appalachian Development Public Transportation Assistance Program), the applicant certifies that—

CATEGORY 10. FIXED GUIDEWAY CAPITAL INVESTMENT GRANTS AND THE EXPEDITED PROJECT DELIVERY FOR CAPITAL INVESTMENT GRANTS PILOT PROGRAM.

If the applicant will apply for an award under any subsection of the Fixed Guideway Capital Investment Program (49 U.S.C. § 5309), including an award made pursuant to the FAST Act's Expedited Project Delivery for Capital Investment Grants Pilot Program (Pub. L. 114-94, div. A, title III, § 3005(b)), the applicant must make the following certification. This certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5309(c)(2) and Pub. L. 114-94, div. A, title III, § 3005(b)(3)(B).

The applicant certifies that it:

- (a) Has or will have the legal, financial, and technical capacity to carry out its Award, including the safety and security aspects of that Award,
- (b) Has or will have satisfactory continuing control over the use of equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award.
- (c) Will maintain equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award in accordance with its transit asset management plan; and
- (d) Will comply with 49 U.S.C. §§ 5303 (metropolitan transportation planning) and 5304 (statewide and nonmetropolitan transportation planning).

CATEGORY 11. GRANTS FOR BUSES AND BUS FACILITIES AND LOW OR NO EMISSION VEHICLE DEPLOYMENT GRANT PROGRAMS.

If the applicant is in an urbanized area and will apply for an award under subsection (a) (formula grants), subsection (b) (buses and bus facilities competitive grants), or subsection (c) (low or no emissions grants) of the Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Program (49 U.S.C. § 5339), the applicant must make the certification in Category 8 for Urbanized Area Formula

Grants (49 U.S.C. § 5307). This certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5339(a)(3), (b)(6), and (c)(3), respectively.

This certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5339(a)(3), (b)(6), and (c)(3), respectively.

CATEGORY 13. STATE OF GOOD REPAIR GRANTS.

If the applicant will apply for an award under FTA's State of Good Repair Grants Program (49 U.S.C. § 5337), it must make the following certification. CATEGORY 16. RAIL SAFETY TRAINING AND OVERSIGHT.

If the applicant is a State with at least one rail fixed guideway system, or is a State Safety Oversight Agency, or operates a rail fixed guideway system, it must make the following certification. The elements of this certification are required by 49 CFR §§ 672.31 and 674.39.

The applicant certifies that the rail fixed guideway public transportation system and the State Safety Oversight Agency for the State are:

- (a) Compliant with the requirements of 49 CFR Part 672, "Public Transportation Safety Certification Training Program"; and

CATEGORY 17. DEMAND RESPONSIVE SERVICE.

 - (3) It will inform FTA promptly if its procurement system does not comply with either of those U.S. DOT regulations.
- (e) It will comply with the Certifications, Assurances, and Agreements in:
 - (1) Category 05.1 and 05.2 (Charter Service Agreement and School Bus Agreement),
 - (2) Category 06 (Transit Asset Management Plan),

- (3) Category 07.1 and 07.2 (Rolling Stock Buy America Reviews and Bus Testing),
- (4) Category 09 (Formula Grants for Rural Areas),
- (5) Category 15 (Alcohol and Controlled Substances Testing), and
- (6) Category 17 (Demand Responsive Service).

CATEGORY 21. EMERGENCY RELIEF PROGRAM.

An applicant to the Public Transportation Emergency Relief Program, 49 U.S.C. § 5324, must make the following certification. The certification is required by 49 U.S.C. § 5324(f) and must be made before the applicant can receive a grant under the Emergency Relief program.
